Highlights of the Month

In Ms. Vermeulen's math classroom, third graders have been busy with multiplication, division, and reviewing some second grade concepts.

While practicing multiplication and division, students have worked in small groups to find tricks to make multiplying and dividing easier. We have also practiced many story problems, remembering to look for key words that help us decide whether to multiply or divide.

In addition, we have done some reviewing on perimeter, fractions, and subtraction with regrouping. These are often tricky topics for third graders. Students have practiced these topics so they will not be fooled when they are completing their "remembering," section of their homework!

What you can do at home

- Flash cards! Multiplication and division flash cards are a great way to help students master their facts.
- Practice with subtraction Students often need to revisit a math skill after it has not been used in a few months.
- MobyMax.com This is a great website to have your students practicing math skills while using technology!
