Highlights of the Month

In Ms. Vermeulen's math classroom, fourth graders have been busy with different division strategies just like in their classroom! Similar to the multiplication unit, I often have students practice their least confident method when they are with me, so we can go through the challenges together.

Students have been working as a team to help one another with division problems each tackling a different strategy. We have also played different division games to help strengthen our understanding. Students have been mastering the vocabulary for division such as, "dividend," "divisor," and "compatible numbers." Vocabulary is essential to math understanding.

What you can do at home

- Flash cards! Multiplication and division flash cards are a great way to help students master their facts. Ask me for a link to free flash cards!
- Do not allow students to rely on multiplication chart Students are having a difficult time completing problems without a chart. Remind your student that a chart won't be available when they need to do math at a store. Try to have them use it only to check their work!
