Highlights of the Month

In Ms. Vermeulen's math classroom, fifth graders have been busy with operations related to fractions and decimals.

Students and I work together in my room to NOT feel overwhelmed by challenging problems or lots of words. We go through story problems systematically so that we are not stumped after one read-through. They are working hard at reading the problem and going through the steps!

We spend time in my classroom learning new concepts, and other times I work with students fixing old homework. Homework should be seen as PRACTICE. When a homework grade is low, it simply just means a student needs more practice before that concept is mastered. Homework is a crucial part of a math student's success.

What you can do at home

- Flash cards! Multiplication and division flash cards are a great way to help students master their facts. Ask me for a link to free flash cards!
- Suggest to do homework in chunks
 The homework this year is often more
 than just 15 minutes of sitting down at
 a desk. Allow your student to take
 breaks instead of finishing it
 all at once. This might help
 a lot of the silly errors
 made at the end of
 assignments.
